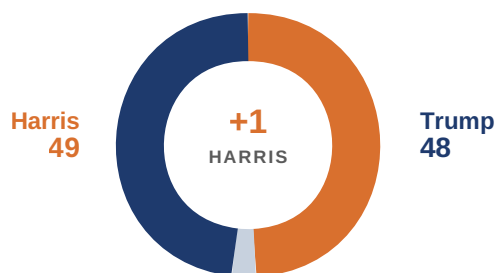

A district split down the middle on the President

These same respondents divided **49 to 48 for Harris** in 2024 and divide **50 to 49 on Trump** today. The five point congressional lead is ticket splitting, not a Republican leaning sample.

/ THE COALITION

The lead is built on crossover votes

Lawler holds Republicans **82 to 14**, wins the unaffiliated middle, and takes nearly a quarter of registered Democrats, in an electorate Democrats out register **41 to 30**.

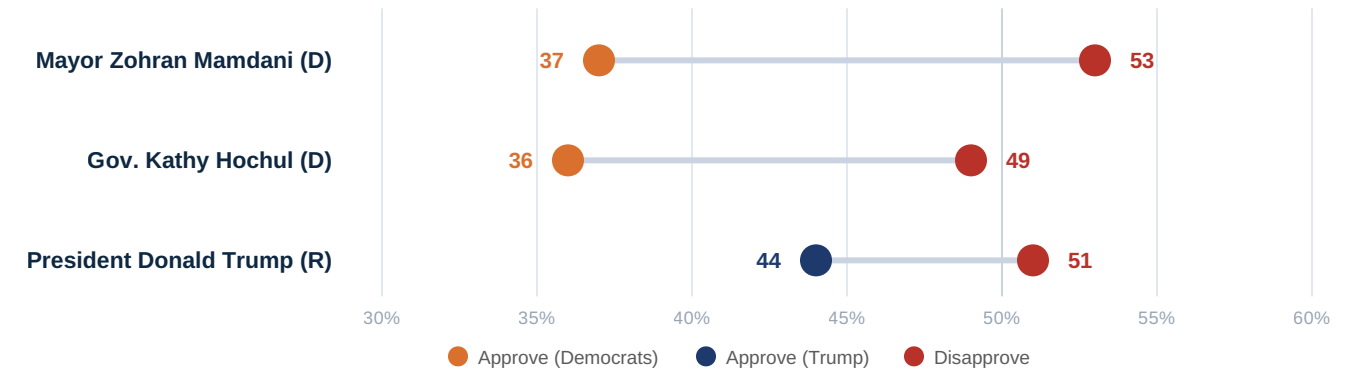
THE READ

In a district where registered Democrats outnumber Republicans by eleven points and that split 49 to 48 for Harris in 2024, **Lawler holds 50 percent and a five point lead.**

/ THE ENVIRONMENT

New York Democrats are underwater in NY-17

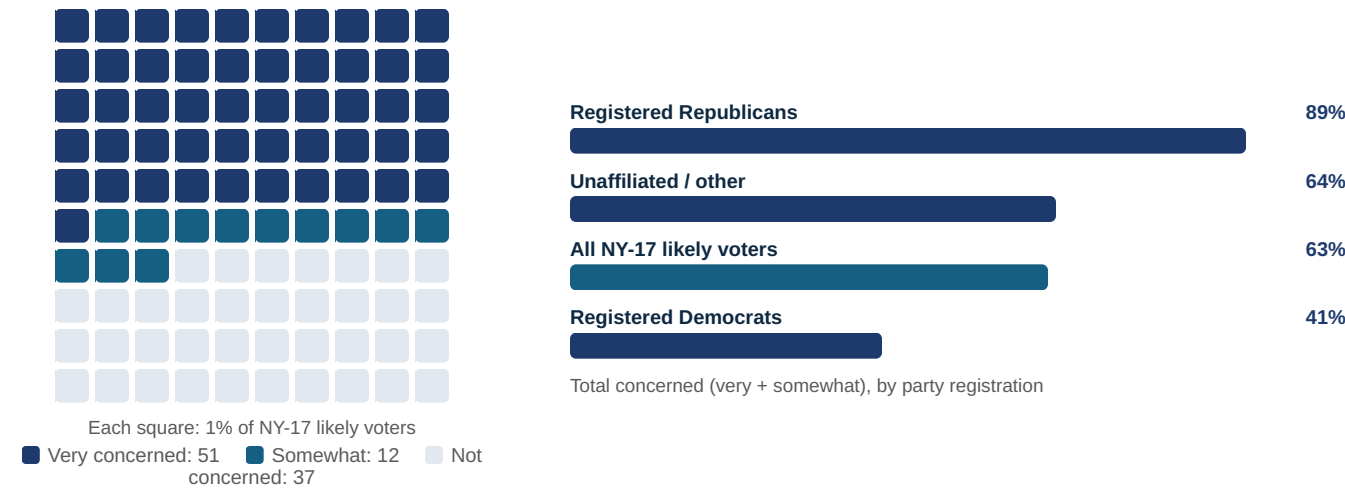
The party's two most visible New York figures both post double digit negative job ratings here, and President Trump's **44 percent approval runs 7 to 8 points higher** than the marks voters give Mamdani (37) and Hochul (36).



/ THE SOCIALISM FACTOR

63% are concerned about the rise of socialism in New York

A **51 percent majority is very concerned** about the rise of socialism and of DSA candidates, and the worry reaches **64 percent of unaffiliated voters**, the same bloc breaking to Lawler by fifteen.



BOTTOM LINE

An incumbent at **50 percent** with only 5 percent undecided, carrying unaffiliated voters by fifteen and nearly a quarter of registered Democrats, against a party whose New York leaders are all underwater in a district where 63 percent worry about the rise of socialism: **the fundamentals of this race favor Lawler.**

/ METHODOLOGY & SAMPLE COMPOSITION

Survey of **1,292 likely general election voters** in New York's 17th Congressional District, conducted using mobile text responses and landline interviews. Results are weighted on the age, gender, education level, race, county, and registered party of the likely general electorate. Margin of error +/- 2.71%. **Not sponsored by any candidate or candidates committee.**
